construction. Dedicated to Lord Jagannath, a revered form of Lord Vishnu, the temple has endured centuries, witnessed the ebb and flow of history while remained an unwavering symbol of devotion and cultural richness. At its core, the Puri Jagannath Temple is a spiritual haven for millions of Hindus. The presiding deities—Lord Jagannath, Lord Balabhadra, and their sister Subhadra—are worshipped with deep reverence (A. Mohanty, 2022a). The temple's sanctity is accentuated by the unique wooden idols of the deities, which undergo replacement every 12 or 19 years in the sacred Nabakalebara ritual, symbolizing continuity and renewal. This cyclical renewal ritual, an integral aspect of the temple's religious practices, adds a dynamic dimension to its cultural and spiritual legacy. The Rath Yatra, or Chariot Festival, is a pinnacle of the temple's cultural prominence. Annually, the deities are placed on massive chariots and pulled through the streets by a sea of devotees. This grand procession attracts pilgrims and spectators from across the globe, exemplifying the universal appeal and cultural richness of the temple. The Rath Yatra is not merely a religious event; it is a spectacle that unites people from diverse backgrounds, fostering a sense of communal harmony and shared spirituality. The architectural brilliance of the Puri Jagannath Temple is a testament to the skill of ancient Odishan craftsmen. The temple follows the Kalinga style of architecture, characterized by intricate carvings, spires, and sculptures depicting mythological narratives. The walls of the temple are adorned with stories from Hindu epics, reflecting the artistic and cultural sensibilities of the era. Each carving tells a tale, contributing to the narrative tapestry of Indian mythology (D. Mohanty, 2015).

Throughout its existence, the Puri Jagannath Temple has faced various historical challenges. It has weathered invasions, witnessed the rise and fell of empires, and stood resilient against the passage of time. The temple's survival and continued significance highlight its enduring cultural and spiritual impact, making it a living testament to the tenacity of tradition in the face of historical upheavals. The temple administration maintains strict traditions, ensuring that only Hindus are allowed within the temple premises. This exclusivity adds an additional layer of sanctity, preserving the sacred atmosphere within the temple. The daily rituals, including the preparation and distribution of Mahaprasad (food offered to the deities), contribute to the unique cultural practices that define the temple's identity. In addition to its religious and cultural role, the Puri Jagannath Temple serves as a symbol of Odisha's cultural heritage. It reflects the synthesis of art, architecture, and spirituality, creating a sacred space that transcends temporal boundaries. The temple is not merely a physical structure but a living entity, pulsating with the energy of centuries of devotion, rituals, and cultural expressions. The Puri Jagannath Temple stands as a timeless testament to India's cultural and spiritual wealth. Its historical roots, architectural grandeur, religious practices, and cultural celebrations converge to create a tapestry of significance that resonates across the ages. 3. Research Methodology

Researchers employed a mixed-method approach that combined quantitative and qualitative method in order to give a thorough investigation.

Research Design

This paper adopts a mixed-method research design, incorporating both quantitative and qualitative methods to conduct a thorough analysis of Puri Jagannath Temple.

Data Collection Methods

The primary data gathering strategy involves a scheduled interview schedule conducted with both management and tourist of the temple. This approach allowed researchers to capture the opinions of key stakeholders. Additionally, researchers relied on their own observations, recognizing the qualitative nature of certain aspects that are challenging to quantify.

Sample Size and Data Collection

The study collected data from a sample of 100 individuals through structured interviews. Each respondent was individually interviewed, and the questionnaire's questions were presented in a straightforward manner to ensure clarity and ease of response.

Analysis Methods

The SWOT analysis model was utilized by the researcher to determine the important aspects influencing the development of the tourism industry at Puri Jagannath Temple, as well as to guide strategic activities for balanced and sustainable growth (Puyt et al., 2023).

4. Review of the Literature

Patnaik, S. K. (2007) in his article discusses the significant role of culture and religion in India in promoting tourism. It highlights the rich diversity of religions and cultural traditions in India, drawing attention to the various temples, architectural styles, beliefs, customs, and rituals across the country. Puri is specifically mentioned as a cultural and religious tourist destination that offers a glimpse into pan-Indian religious beliefs and cultural essence through its rituals and customs. It also notes Puri's significance for devout Hindus and its appeal to salvation-seeking foreigners, as well as its importance as a link to the Indian roots for many NRIs. The article suggests that foreign tourists seek history, culture, shopping, entertainment, and relaxation when visiting such destinations in India. **Patnaik, L. (2008)** in his article, he discussed that, the holy city of Puri, located in Orissa, India, known for its significant religious and cultural importance. It highlights Puri's geographical location, its association with the revered Jagannath Temple, and its historical significance as a center of pilgrimage, described in various ancient texts and modern chronicles. The city is also recognized as a hub of learning, with notable visitors like Adi Shankaracharya and other religious leaders establishing ashrams and contributing to its spiritual heritage. Additionally, Puri's artisans and craftsmen are celebrated for their exquisite work, contributing to the city's cultural richness. The document also touches upon the sacredness of Puri's Mahaprasad and the city's ability to accommodate a large number of pilgrims and tourists with its hospitable community and ample lodging facilities. **Mohanty, J. (2010)** in his article, He elucidates the significance of Puri, also known as Purusottam, as one of the four renowned Dhams in India, a designation conferred by Adi Shankaracharya in the eighth century A.D. Acknowledged as a prominent pilgrimage site, the Gajapati King of Puri held a position of paramount royal authority entrusted with the preservation of ancient traditions and the orchestration of extensive rituals, including year-round festivals featuring various Pujas, Veshas, Prasads, and Mahaprasads. The daily lives of the residents, along with their customs, traditions, ceremonies, and festivals, bear the indelible influence of Lord Jagannath, the principal deity of Puri, and the overarching Jagannath culture. **Sahoo, D. (2012)** in his article He explores the prospective realm of religious tourism in Odisha, India, a land hosting venerable temple, captivating Jain caves, and enchanting Buddhist monasteries. The article advocates for the elevation of religious tourism to the status of special interest tourism and underscores the necessity for the rejuvenation of tourist infrastructure in recognized pilgrimage hubs. A confidential survey conducted by a market research agency reveals that, out of every 100 tourists, merely two choose Orissa as their pilgrimage destination. The National Tourism Advisory Council highlights the pivotal role played by pilgrimage tourism in propelling the influx of domestic tourists to the country. **Mohanty, R.N. & Chani, P. S. (2019)** in their article they presented that pedestrians in Puri express high satisfaction with elements associated with aesthetics, indicating a positive aspect of their overall travel experience. The safety-related factors emerge as the second most influential contributors to pedestrians' satisfaction in Puri. However, a notable issue is the absence of guidelines for visual merchandising, which significantly impacts the city's current state. Another substantial concern is the encroachment upon heritage properties, posing a threat to the thousand-year-old heritage of Puri. Despite being recognized as a heritage city, only four structures receive protection from the Archaeological Survey of India (ASI) and the Archaeological Survey of Odisha. The lack of preservation efforts for other heritage structures poses a direct and impending threat to the tangible heritage of Puri. **Mullick, P.D. & Das, A. (2014)** in their article they provide an overview of the potential for social research in Puri, India, focusing on various dimensions such as art, craft, religious organizations, tourism, and disaster studies. It discusses Puri's association with the mythical and mystical identities of lord Jagannatha, its significance as a religious and geographical space, and the potential for multidimensional social research. It examines the impact of globalization on traditional crafts, the role of religious organizations like the Sevayats and Mathas, the spiritual tourism at Puri, and the vulnerability to disasters, emphasizing the need for in-depth and interdisciplinary research in these areas. The paper highlights that while Puri is a popular pilgrimage center, research efforts in these dimensions are limited, and it encourages collaborative initiatives to explore and understand the diverse social, economic, and cultural aspects of Puri comprehensively. **Mohanty, R. & Samal. A. (2023)** in their paper they argued that, Tourism plays a pivotal role in India's economy, fostering positive impacts on both economic aspects and the cultural fabric of the nation. India, with its rich history and diverse

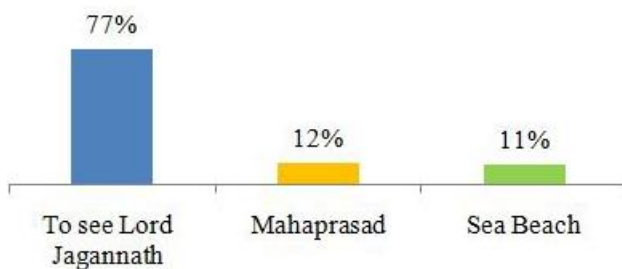

The Puri Jagannath Temple holds immense religious significance, especially for Hindus. It is one of the Char Dham pilgrimage sites, attracting devout followers who seek spiritual fulfillment. The temple is dedicated to Lord Jagannath, an incarnation of Lord Vishnu, making it a revered destination for religious rituals, festivals, and pilgrimage. The sanctity of the site and the associated religious practices make it a focal point for religious tourism, drawing devotees from various parts of the world. Fig No. 1: Justification for choosing this location

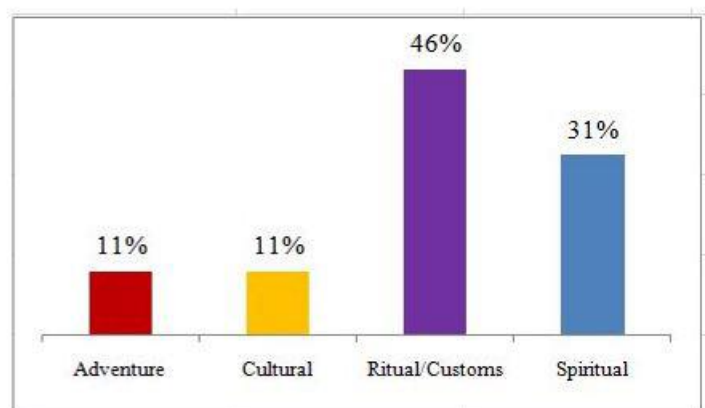


The majority of respondents, constituting 77% of the total, visit Puri primarily to witness Lord Jagannath. Additionally, 12% of respondents stated that they come to Puri for the dual purpose of experiencing the presence of the Lord and relishing Mahaprasad. A further 11% of all respondents gave different explanations for their visit, and the majority of visitors—nearly all of them—are happy with the

temple's administration.

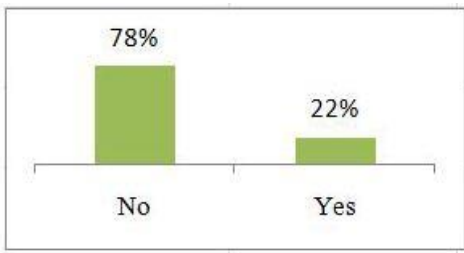
Puri draws visitors mostly for religious tourism, which is defined as adventure, cultural, rites/customs, and spiritual activities at sacred locations. It also gave them moral fulfilment and mental tranquillity, both of which are quite valuable. This Fig No. 2 demonstrates that 46% of respondents place a higher value on locations connected to rituals or customs when thinking about religious tourism. The second most popular tourist destination among the respondents is Spiritual Place. With 11% of the total, places associated to adventure and culture follow behind these two.

It was evident that a significant majority of tourists, accounting for approximately 78%, exhibited a clear reluctance towards the idea of commercializing the Puri Temple. These respondents expressed reservations about introducing commercial elements to the sacred site. On the flip side, the remaining 22% of participants expressed a contrasting viewpoint, indicating a favorable stance toward the commercialization of the temple. This minority group saw potential benefits or perhaps modern amenities enhancing their overall experience without compromising the spiritual essence of

the Puri Temple. The divergence in opinions highlights the varied perspectives among tourists regarding the commercialization of this revered religious site.

The table above discusses the respondents' opinions of the different services available at this location. *Communication Facilities and Accommodation Facilities:* All respondents seem to have a very positive view regarding these facilities, indicating that they are satisfied with the communication and accommodation options available at Jagannath Temple.

Security Facilities: About one-fifth (1/5th) of the respondents are very much satisfied with the security facilities, while the rest are simply satisfied. This suggests that a majority of respondents find the security measures at the temple to be satisfactory, although there is a notable percentage that is not very much satisfied.

Market Facilities: Opinions on market facilities vary among respondents. Some people find it average, while 58% are satisfied, and 31% are very much satisfied. This indicates a generally positive view of the market facilities, with a significant portion expressing high satisfaction.

Food Availability Services: When it comes to food availability services, there seems to be a contrasting opinion. Some respondents are dissatisfied, suggesting that there may be issues or concerns related to the food services at the Jagannath Temple.

In summary, respondents generally have positive views on communication facilities, accommodation facilities, and market facilities at the Jagannath Temple. However, there are concerns about security facilities, with a portion of respondents not being very satisfied. The most notable dissatisfaction appears in the area of food availability services, where some respondent's express dissatisfaction. These findings can be valuable for the management of the temple to address areas of concern and further improve the overall experience for visitors.

6. Opportunities in Tourism at Puri Jagannath Temple

A. Religious significance: The Puri Jagannath Temple, dedicated to Lord Jagannath, Balabhadra, and Subhadra, holds immense religious significance in Hinduism. It is considered one of the Char Dham pilgrimage sites and is particularly famous for the annual Rath Yatra, during which the deities are ceremoniously carried in massive chariots, attracting millions of devotees seeking spiritual blessings. The temple is believed to be a sacred abode of Lord Jagannath, symbolizing a place of divine worship and pilgrimage in the Hindu tradition.

Attraction for pilgrims: The Puri Jagannath Temple stands as a magnetic force for pilgrims, drawing them from far and wide due to its compelling attractions rooted in spirituality and tradition. Central to its allure is the enshrining of Lord Jagannath, believed to be an incarnation of Lord Vishnu, making it one

of the holiest sites for Hindus. The temple's rich history, dating back centuries, adds an air of reverence and authenticity to the pilgrimage experience. The annual Rath Yatra, where the deities are paraded through the streets on elaborately decorated chariots, is a major attraction, attracting millions of devotees who seek to witness this grand spectacle and partake in the divine energy it exudes. The temple's unique rituals, such as the sacred food offerings known as Mahaprasad, hold a special appeal, with pilgrims considering it a blessing to partake in these offerings. The spiritual ambiance, coupled with the architectural grandeur of the temple, creates an immersive and deeply meaningful experience for pilgrims, fostering a sense of connection with the divine and providing a spiritual journey that lingers in the hearts of those who make the pilgrimage to Puri Jagannath Temple.

Rituals and festivals drawing a large crowd: The Puri Jagannath Temple is a vibrant center of religious fervor, attracting a large crowd with its myriad rituals and festivals that add a colorful tapestry to the spiritual landscape. One of the most prominent events is the Rath Yatra, or Chariot Festival, where the deities—Lord Jagannath, Lord Balabhadra, and Devi Subhadra—are ceremoniously placed on lavishly decorated chariots and paraded through the streets of Puri. This grand procession draws millions of devotees, both local and from distant places, who seek the divine blessings and the opportunity to pull the colossal chariots.

The Chandan Yatra is another significant festival, marking the commencement of the construction of the Rath for the Rath Yatra. During this time, the deities are anointed with a paste of sandalwood and water to combat the heat of the summer season. Pilgrims actively participate in this ritual, adding to the vibrant atmosphere.

Moreover, the Snana Yatra, an elaborate bathing ceremony of the deities, witnesses a large congregation of devotees who throng the temple premises to witness the sacred event. The Puri Jagannath Temple also hosts various other festivals, such as Navratri and Kartik Purnima, each characterized by unique rituals and fervent celebrations that captivate the devotees. These rituals and festivals not only showcase the rich cultural heritage of the temple but also serve as a powerful magnet, drawing a diverse and enthusiastic crowd, eager to partake in the divine festivities at this sacred abode.

B. Cultural heritage: The Puri Jagannath Temple is a cornerstone of India's cultural heritage, showcasing a blend of architectural grandeur and religious traditions. The temple's annual Rath Yatra, with its vibrant processions and rituals, reflects a centuries-old cultural legacy, attracting not only devotees but also enthusiasts and tourists interested in experiencing the rich cultural tapestry of the region. The temple complex itself stands as a testament to the artistic and architectural prowess of ancient India, contributing significantly to the cultural heritage of the country.

Built in the 12th century by King Anantavarman Chodaganga Deva, the temple holds historical importance as a symbol of Odisha's enduring religious heritage. Its construction reflects the Kalinga style of architecture, characterized by intricately carved spires, exquisite sculptures, and a prominent emphasis on temple elevation. The temple's towering spire, known as the "Bada Deula," is a remarkable example of the Kalinga style, capturing the attention of visitors with its ornate detailing and imposing structure. The historical significance of the Puri Jagannath Temple is further heightened by its association with various dynasties and rulers who have contributed to its expansion and maintenance over the centuries. The temple complex, with its walls adorned with sculptures depicting mythological narratives and religious motifs, serves as a living museum of ancient art and architecture.

The temple's unique construction, with its intricate carvings, sacred shrines, and ceremonial halls, not only reflects the devotion of its builders but also provides a glimpse into the cultural and religious ethos of the region. It continues to be a pilgrimage site for millions, drawing not only the faithful but also

scholars, historians, and art enthusiasts keen on exploring the historical and architectural treasures encapsulated within the sacred precincts of the Puri Jagannath Temple.

C. Economic benefits: The Puri Jagannath Temple contributes significantly to the economic prosperity of the region through tourism-related activities. The annual Rath Yatra attracts a large number of pilgrims and tourists, boosting local businesses, hospitality services, and generating employment opportunities. Additionally, the temple's rituals and festivals stimulate the local economy by fostering a vibrant market for religious and cultural merchandise.

Employment opportunities: Tourism can play a crucial role in creating significant job opportunities for the local population in the context of the Puri Jagannath Temple. As a revered pilgrimage site and cultural landmark, the temple attracts a substantial number of domestic and international tourists, contributing to the growth of the local economy. Here are several ways in which tourism can generate employment for the local community:

Hospitality Industry: The influx of tourists necessitates the development of hotels, guesthouses, and restaurants in the vicinity. This leads to job opportunities in various roles such as hotel management, housekeeping, catering, and customer service.

Tour Guides and Interpreters: Many tourists seek guided tours to enhance their experience and understanding of the temple's history and rituals. Local residents can serve as knowledgeable guides, offering insights into the cultural and spiritual significance of the Puri Jagannath Temple.

Art and Craftsmanship: The demand for souvenirs and traditional handicrafts related to the temple creates opportunities for local artisans and craftsmen. This includes the production of religious artifacts, paintings, sculptures, and other items that cater to the tourist market.

Transport Services: Tourism often leads to an increased demand for transportation services such as taxis, auto-rickshaws, and cycle rickshaws. Locals can find employment as drivers, guides, or in maintenance roles within the transportation sector.

Event Management: The temple hosts various festivals and events throughout the year, attracting a large audience. Local individuals can find employment in event planning, coordination, security, and other related services.

Retail and Small Businesses: The rise in tourist footfall supports the establishment of local shops and markets selling religious artifacts, clothing, and other goods. This creates job opportunities for individuals involved in retail, sales, and entrepreneurship.

Cultural Performances: Tourism often sparks an interest in cultural performances and traditional art forms. Local performers, musicians, and dancers can find employment through regular cultural shows and events organized for tourists.

By harnessing the economic potential of tourism, the Puri Jagannath Temple can become a catalyst for community development, offering sustainable employment opportunities and fostering overall socio-economic growth in the region. However, it's essential to balance the benefits of tourism with the preservation of the temple's sanctity and the well-being of the local community.

D. Infrastructure development:

Tourism-related projects improving facilities: Initiated in 2016, the Puri Heritage Corridor Project was officially introduced in December 2019 with the aim of elevating the town into a globally recognized heritage destination. The comprehensive project involves the revitalization of key areas within the town and its proximity to the temple, catering specifically to visitors and tourists. In February 2020, a unanimous resolution in the state assembly paved the way for the project's commencement, with the initial phase projected to cost Rs 800 crore. Subsequently, the Shree Jagannath Temple Administration (SJTA) granted approval for the architectural design plan, estimating the entire project's cost at Rs 3,200 crore. A total of 22 distinct projects are slated for phased implementation. The state government's Augmentation of Basic Amenities and Development of Heritage and Architecture at Puri (ABADHA) scheme has allocated an initial Rs 800 crore, with an additional Rs 265 crore earmarked for the first phase (Vishwanath, 2022). Notable aspects of the project include the redevelopment of the SJTA building, a 600-capacity Srimandir reception center, the Jagannath cultural center featuring the Raghunandan library, an integrated command and control center, Badadanda heritage streetscape, Srimandir amenities enhancement, Sri Setu, Jagannath Ballav pilgrim center, multilevel car parking, municipal market

development, Swargadwar development, Pramod Udyan, Gurukulam, Mahodadhi market, beachfront development, Puri lake, Musa river revival plan, Atharnala, and housing for sevayats (A. Mohanty, 2022b).
